## Meet Our January Guest Ministers

The **Reverend Dr. Richard Speck** is the District Executive for the Joseph Priestley District and will be preaching at Goodloe on Jan. 9. Previously, he served nine years as minister to the UU Fellowship of Vero Beach, FL, before coming to the JPD in 2000 as Acting District Executive. In his last two years in Florida he also served as the music director for the church. He graduated from Meadville/Lombard Theological School with a Doctorate in Ministry in 1990. He was hired as the regular District Executive in 2001.

Richard became a Unitarian Universalist as a layperson in Springfield, IL, in 1974. He was an active lay member of the

Unitarian Universalist Church of Birmingham, AL, before going into the ministry. In that congregation he held a variety of leadership positions (vice president, secretary, canvasser, choir member, lay delegate) and was active in the social life of the church.

Richard's career before the ministry was as a respiratory therapist for eighteen years. He is married to Janet Tillman and resides in Wilmington, Del. He enjoys making music, flying his own airplane, and creating stained glass art. Janet and Richard have one cat, Cassie Olympia Brown Tillman.

**Rev. John T. Crestwell Jr.**, is the associate minister the Unitarian Universalist Church of Annapolis and will be preaching at Goodloe on Jan. 30. He is also the outreach director of the UU Legislative Ministry of Maryland (UULM-MD). He received a Masters in Theology from Wesley Theological Seminary in Washington, DC. He is committed to working for the marginalized and oppressed and is a self-proclaimed UU Evangelist. He is formerly the minister of Davies Memorial UU Church in Camp Springs, Maryland where he assisted the congregation in expanding into a multiracial congregation.

Rev. Crestwell currently serves on the UUA President's Council and on the National Cancer Institute Institutional Review Board (IRB) under the National Institutes of Health in Bethesda, Maryland. He is formerly a board member of the UULM-MD, UMR Communications in Dallas, Texas, and the UU Church of the Larger Fellowship (CLF).

He has also been an adjunct professor at Potomac College in Washington, DC, teaching Comparative Religion, Ethics, African American History and Public

Speaking. John also hosts an Internet podcast: "The Barbershop" political radio show on local and national issues during the Maryland General Assembly. Prior to ministry, Rev. John worked in marketing and advertising.



## Special Collections

We will have two special collections during services in January to benefit UU area organizations doing important outreach work in Maryland.

The first collection will be on Jan. 9 for the Chesapeake UU Growth (ChUUG) committee. ChUUG encourages collaboration among 30 congregations in our regions. They sponsor hospitality and leadership seminars to help congregations to attract and retain new members. ChUUG is conducting a Google Ad campaign to attract visitors through the internet. The second collection will be on Jan. 30 for the UU Legislative Ministry of Maryland (UULM-MD), a statewide network working to mobilize and coordinate the advocacy and education of UUs on specific issues. Partnering with national UU organizations and other like-minded coalitions, UULM-MD provides a voice for UU principles and traditions in the discussions of environmental responsibility and human rights issues. As most of you know I will be on sabbatical from Goodloe in January and February. 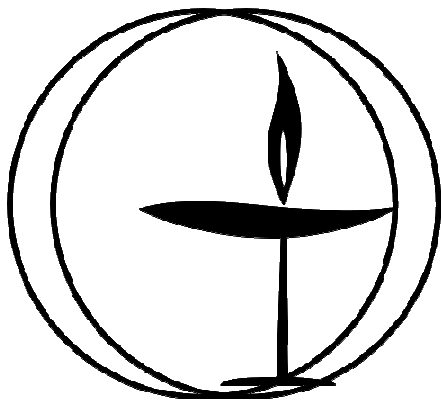

## From the Religious Exploration Program

Happy New Year!

One of the primary goals of the Religious Exploration (RE) department is the development of Goodloe's RE *program*. Yes, we have classes that meet each week and we have the staff to teach these classes. But, a *program* is more than classes. A program is institutional memory (so that new DRE's won't have to recreate the wheel). It's policies and procedures that allows our staff and volunteers to serve our community better. It's also safety mechanism that works to protect our children, our community and our church.

In the spirit of new beginnings and an ever-growing program, the RE committee is releasing several new tools during the month of January:

- Reimbursement Forms – Teachers and volunteers are asked to fill out reimbursement forms whenever they need to be reimbursed for products and services provided to the RE department. Cash reimbursements must be pre-approved by either Tisha Richardson, the DRE, or Nita Page-Daves, RE Committee chair.

- Donation Forms – Teachers, volunteers, and community members are asked to fill out donation forms whenever they donate products with cash value (whether new, used, or edible). These forms will allow the RE committee to do several things:
  - A) Recognize and thank the members of our community who go above and beyond in their support of the RE program.
  - B) Develop an understanding of the true costs of running the RE program.
- New RE Brochure – After many months of development and revision, the RE committee will be releasing its new brochure. The purpose of this brochure is to provide visitors with an overview of the goals, policies and procedures of Goodloe's RE program.
- Mandatory Volunteer Meeting – All program volunteers are asked to meet with the DRE on Sunday, January 23, 2011 at 12 noon. This will be an extremely short meeting. The purpose of this meeting is a very necessary discussion on safety and ethics in the RE department. I thank everyone for attending. ## In Memory of Freda Mauldin

At the end of last year one of our members at Goodloe, Freda Mauldin, died. Her family asked that donations given in her memory be dedicated to a social action project. As the one year anniversary of her death came, the board made a decision on the disbursement of the monies, which were about \$900.

There is a new group just starting in Prince George's County, a LGBTQ Youth Task Force. This group is working with kids in foster care, some of whom just ended up there when they came out to their parents as gay or transgendered and were thrown out of their homes. The task force is doing training for the Department of Social Services, the school system, juvenile justice, etc. on working with LGBTQ kids. They are doing four social events for LGBTQ youth and their friends each year. They would like to grow to the point where they can hire a staff person to work with the youth on a more ongoing basis.

Rev. Archene Turner, a UU minister who has taken the Our Whole Lives (OWL) sexuality education program, a program collaboratively developed by the Unitarian Universalists and the United Church of Christ, out into the community by doing the program with staff at a community center, after school program or school so that they can then take it over as a regular part of their own programming, has taken training to be part of the Prince George's LGBTQ task force's training effort and has made some connections to possibly take OWL to groups within the county. Cyn has also taken the training and has become involved with the task force. The Mauldin Memorial monies that were not otherwise designated will be given to the LGBTQ task force with \$200 reserved and given to OWL OUT for use in Prince George's County. Our congregation can be involved by offering snacks or chaperons for events, volunteering with the task force, helping with grant proposals, and helping with fund raisers.

The board felt that this designation would honor Freda Mauldin's interest in human rights issues and in youth. It would also allow the congregation to be

part of a project that we do not have to develop and run ourselves as a small congregation but could contribute to and help. Below is a note from Freda's daughter the Rev. Jane Mauldin. Brian is Freda Mauldin's son.

Dear Cynthia:

What a wonderful use of the money given in our Mom's memory. I think that she would be very pleased. She worked with children and youth for decades and was deeply committed to numerous civil rights causes. This project, as you note, addresses her interest in human rights issues and in youth. I love that it also offers opportunities for members of the congregation to become involved, as they are able.

Thank you for letting me know how the monies are to be used. Brian and I both trusted that whatever you all decided to do with the memorial funds would be right and appropriate. It is a special kindness to let us know, at this season, how her memory will live on in helping to create better lives for struggling youth.

I am also personally very grateful again, this season, for your congregation and for your personal - and congregational - lovely and sensitive ministry to my mother, over the years. It speaks volumes about your congregation and about the faith that you all embody that there is not only a place and a mission for boisterous youth, but also for aging elders whose gifts may not always be as apparent as they once were, but whose "worth and dignity" are appreciated and honored. Please share my gratitude and my holiday greetings with the leaders and members of Goodloe Memorial UU Congregation. I hope that the hope and joy that you all share with others is coming back to you all ten-fold, this season.

## **Goodloe's Inclement Weather Policy** (You WILL be looking for this information soon.)



The following policy will apply whenever weather or other conditions could prevent our congregation from holding scheduled services or any other activity or event.

These conditions include:

- Winter storms: snow, ice, sleet, freezing rain, icy roads, etc.
- Water-related problems: hurricane, flooding, etc.
- Building problems: power outage, leaking roof, etc.

2. Responsibility for determining whether a Goodloe activity will be canceled or moved to another location resides with:

- The convener or chair of a committee meeting, social event, or other activity that is not a regularly-scheduled worship service
- For a regularly scheduled worship service, the following persons will confer with each other in making the decision whether or not to cancel services:
  - President or, in his/her absence, the Vice President
  - Minister
  - Worship Committee Chair
  - Leader of the service
  - Director of Religious Education or RE chair

3. In the event that any condition exists that could interfere with holding a regularly-scheduled worship service, the President shall:

- Contact the person scheduled to lead the service (the minister, lay leader or visiting presenter) to determine whether that person will be arriving as planned

4. In the event that the President, Minister or Worship Chair determines that a regularly-scheduled service should be canceled or moved to another location, he/she shall immediately notify the following people by phone:

- The email administrator who will send out an email message to the congregation
- The webmaster who will post a notice on the Goodloe web site
- DRE – who will notify all teachers scheduled that day
- Choir Director – who will notify all choir members
- Set-up crew

In addition, the President shall:

- Record a new outgoing message on the answering machine

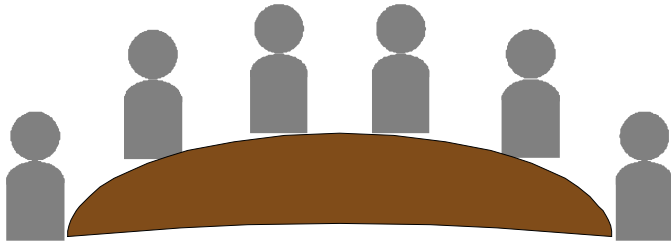
5. In the event that the convener or chair determines that the event or activity should be moved or canceled, he/she shall

- If the event is a congregation-wide or public event
  - Notify the email administrator who will send out an email message to the congregation
  - Record a new outgoing message on the answering machine.
- If the event is a regularly scheduled meeting and the group has elected to follow the inclement weather policy of a county group (e.g., Prince George's County School System), no notification is necessary for inclement weather.
- If the event is not congregation-wide and no county inclement weather policy is selected or the reason for cancellation is not due to weather, notify all planned participants of the decision.

6. Inform the congregation annually in the autumn of the inclement weather policy.

  - 3) We talked about need for more one on one visits so we get to know each other
  - 4) Encourage growth of multicultural community
- **Governance**
  - 1) Give guidance to nomination committee in selecting candidates for President, Vice-President, Financial Officer (presumably Barbara), Trustee
  - 2) Create a Facilities committee; find a facilities manager
  - 3) Each board member should oversee, provide focus for a ministry.
- **Communication** – publicity, website, newsletter, emails – all ongoing; found new newsletter editor
- **Social Action** (helping others) - We discuss and approved support to three requests:
  - 1) Spiral Scouts can meet at Goodloe,
  - 2) We will provide funds to support OWL-OUT in Prince George’s county,
