## Religious Exploration: Out of the Box

The children in our RE program have been hearing stories of folks, like Dan West from Heifer Inc., who looked at circumstances where people were suffering and came up with a original responses.

Like any one of us, Dan West was a regular guy who saw children starving as a result of war. Instead of sticking with the usual ways that we respond to suffering - collecting and donating supplies, food, and in Mr. West's case, milk, he came up with an original idea: give families cows! What I like

about this story is how Mr. West took the problem to his church family and asked for ideas. The farmers in his congregation could look at the problem from a different perspective. Together, they evolved a way for dairy cows to be transported to Europe. Families were trained in animal husbandry. Bulls were also sent so that when a new calf was born, the family would give it to another family and train them how to care for it. Now Heifer Inc. provides food and income support through sustainable animal

husbandry and agriculture around the world.

We want our children to practice thinking outside the box - to stretch themselves to see new solutions to the world's problems. To learn how to work with others to manifest their dreams and visions for a better world.

For our size congregation, we now have a minister, a DRE, a choir director, and a pianist - four staff members. We have a choir and a bell choir. And we reach out throughout the district in many ministries. Remarkable, Incredible.

Unbelievable. We are mighty for our size congregation. And there is no other same size congregation in the nation that can match us. And the energy is growing anew.

I get tired and despair. And then it happens again - that clarion call. I hear people speak about how this congregation affects their life. "I am not alone." "there are non-brown people who care about me." "this is my family". I listen to a new young boy come and play the harp for the first time. I am wowed by the significance of our home school ministry. There are many calls to reach out and invite friends to attend some Goodloe worship or activity.

There are many people who want to see "more people like me". It could be a nine year old

girl, or a thirteen year old boy. It could be a gay couple or a Spanish speaking couple. It could be an Atheist or a Christian. Everyone wants to ask the same question a mother asked me 30 years ago.

"Will my daughter be the only child?" I said "No". For one year, the child was the only child, then more children came and our program grew. We relied on hope and vision that we are here to make a difference.

New people come and bring new energy, new caring ministries. If you want Goodloe to be more, to do more, then invite a Friend to Goodloe. Invite them to the small and mighty congregation. Invite them to come and celebrate in diversity.

Dr. Kevin Maxwell, CEO of the Prince George's County School System will be the keynote speaker at a benefit for a scholarship at Bowie State University on **Saturday, March 29** at the Goodloe Memorial Unitarian Universalist Congregation 1540C Pointer Ridge Place Bowie, MD 20716. The evening will begin with a reception at 6:30. The program will begin at 7:00 p.m.

The evening will include the keynote address with time for questions and answers, music from the Goodloe Memorial

Choir under the direction of Noreen Chin, Bowie State student and a display of Goodloe memorabilia.

The scholarship honors the Rev. Don S.S. Goodloe, first principal of the Normal School at Bowie (now Bowie State University) and namesake of Goodloe Memorial Unitarian Universalist Congregation.

## Voting Rights March—Raleigh, NC

On February 8th Goodloe Memorial UU Congregation was represented by David Goodkind and UUs from across the nation who joined members of the United Church of Christ to stand with the NAACP and other partners in a demonstration to raise awareness about the threats to voting rights in North Carolina that are spreading to other states. Led by Rev. Peter Morales, UUA President, Rev. Geoffrey Black, UCC General Minister, and the Reverend William Barber of the NC NAACP, 1,500 Unitarian Universalists were among 30,000 demonstrators in Raleigh, NC. We have been told that this is the largest number of UUs ever to participate in such a single mass demonstration.

The organizing coalition called for five demands:

1. Secure pro-labor, anti-poverty policies that insure economic sustainability;
2. Provide well-funded, quality public education for all;
3. Stand up for the health of every North Carolinian by promoting health care access and environmental justice

across all the state's communities;

4. Address the continuing inequalities in the criminal justice system and ensure equality under the law for every person, regardless of race, class, creed, documentation or sexual preference;
5. Protect and expand voting rights for people of color, women, immigrants, the elderly and students to safeguard fair democratic representation.

The demonstrators marched from Shaw University to the North Carolina State House, a distance of less than a mile. It took more than an hour for the last marchers to reach their destination. The UU theme of standing on the side of love was reflected in the fact that no arrests or disturbances were reported. It was a diverse group of participants who chanted, danced and sang to the end waving placards on topics ranging from campaign finance reform and education funding to gay rights and abortion rights.



"The state of North Carolina has been one of the more progressive of the old Confederacy states, but lately the state has besmirched that image by passing regressive voter id laws, refusing to expand Medicaid, and by defining marriage as between one man and one woman. On February 8 a large group from UU congregations and thousands of others staged a mass demonstration at the state capital in response. I was pleased and gratified to see such a large turnout, including a large group from All Souls, Unitarian in DC."

## February 19, 2014

**Attendees:** Cynthia Snavelly, Steve Buckingham, Kris Peerman, Sid Soderholm, Pete Boudriault, Sally Raymond, Yaa.

**Building & Facilities:** There is a new microwave. Thank you to the individual who hooked it up.

**Office Equipment:** Sally reports that FiOS service would cost \$84.99/month.

**Kaplan Scheduling:** The class scheduled to start in Feb was canceled. The next one will run from early March—April. Another group asked about using the facility, but our space is not large enough to meet their needs.

**Activities:** Cyn will prepare a write-up for the newsletter with input from David Goodkind about the Feb march in Raleigh, NC.

**Upcoming Activities:** UUSJ is seeking a host for an "Equality for All" film. There will be a conference call with Robert Write on Feb 27. Warm nights still needs volunteers to serve as well as lasagna.

**Membership:** Cyn has certified the membership with Sid's assistance.

**Finances:** Sid requested feedback on the Odyssey submission — The Board was happy with it. The health insurance went up at the

beginning of the year. This goes into Rev. Cyn's total compensation package. The Board will review this issue & consider adjusting Cyn's compensation package. W2's have been sent to the staff.

**Committee on Ministry:** Not yet scheduled. Work is in progress.

**Education Ministry:** Kelly will be giving an update to the congregation at the service on Sunday.

**New Temporary Signs:** The signs have been ordered & will be delivered in 8 days. Sally has not yet ordered the heavy duty sign holder. She has not yet submitted for reimbursement but will do so later.

**Adopt-a-Road:** Pete has a list of volunteers, filled out the application, and is seeking information from SHA about the next step.

**UU Pension Plan Changes:** The current reimbursement benefit for ministers is 10% of salary. There is currently no benefit for part-time employees. New employees would have the option of paying up to 3% of their salary for a tax-free account. We will need to create a written policy for this. We need to make a decision by 1 July in order to make it available for next year. Sid proposed a start date of April 1, and it passed unanimously.



**Social Activities:** Circle Suppers are on hold while Sally's kitchen is being renovated.

**Pledge Drive:** The pledge drive kick-off service and pledge form are ready, and there will be an article in the Odyssey. Sally will include it in the Order of Service, and Jackie will send emails at the beginning & end of the drive. The pledge drive runs through March and will help with the upcoming fiscal year budget planning.

**Goodloe Celebration:** [Details about this event are as described in this newsletter.] Several individuals made suggestions about advertising the event, including mailers, flyers to distribute at Bowie State, and hoping to get an article in the Bowie Blade. Many Goodloe members are volunteering their various talents (choir, research & presentation, decorating, and more).

**eScrip Issue:** There was a problem with the bank being unable to accept a deposit from the eScrip organization. Steve will forward the information to Sid.

**Schedule Changes:** John Pietras suggested that we announce any schedule changes through
