From the President: New Leadership

On May 18, 2014, our congregation will gather after the service for its Annual Meeting. At that time, the Board will report on the past year's activities and present a budget for the coming year, beginning June 30. We will have many accomplishments to celebrate that day, and we will look forward to continued success as a faith community.

However, the only legal requirement of the meeting is to elect leadership for the coming year beginning June 1. This is where we need your help.

Last year, our Nominating Committee failed to find anyone willing to serve as Vice President, so we went the entire year without one. Furthermore, the current Nominating Committee has been decimated by various circumstances, and no one is actively looking for new officers. The Board is now asking for volunteers to serve in the following positions:

- ◆ President, one-year term
- ◆ Vice-President, one-year term
- ◆ Secretary, two-year term
- ◆ Trustee at Large, two-year term
- ◆ 3 Nominating Committee Members, one-year term
- ◆ Congregation's Representative to the Committee on Ministry

Our bylaws provide for an outgoing Board member to serve on the Nominating Committee to provide some continuity. The Committee on Ministry includes representatives of each staff member (minister, DRE, choir director), a Board representative and one for the congregation.

Three current officers will continue to serve the second year of their two-year terms:

- ◆ Financial Officer, Sid Soderholm
- ◆ Trustee at Large, Pete Boudriault
- ◆ Trustee at Large, Sally Raymond

Stepping down are the following:

- ◆ Kris Peerman - Secretary
- ◆ Kevin Smith – who served two years as Trustee at Large after giving us two years as Secretary
- ◆ Myself – President

I am finishing my third consecutive year as President, and I learned from experience that three years is my limit (I served from June 2002 through May 2005). I do not plan to ride off into the sunset, as I have offered to serve on next year's Nominating Committee and as the congregation's representative on the

Committee on Ministry, if you will have me. However, it is time for new individuals to step up and assume leadership roles for our congregation.

Elsewhere in this edition of the Odyssey, we have printed the job descriptions for the open positions and the duties of the Nominating Committee and Committee on Ministry. Please look them over to see if you would like to try one of them.

Serving the congregation has been a very rewarding experience, and I am grateful for all of the tremendous support I have received from other officers, members of the congregation and even those who have not (yet) chosen to become official members. We have a very welcoming group of people who care deeply for each other and the world in which we live. I wish that you all can experience the great joy and satisfaction of serving in some way, large or small, and I expect our future leaders to continue our long string of accomplishments in the coming year and beyond. Please let me or any Board member know how you are willing to contribute to our common future.

Summary report of income and expenses for the first three quarters of Fiscal Year 2013-2014 (July 1, 2013 – March 31, 2014) All figures are rounded to the nearest \$100.

Second Collections amounts:

OPERATING INCOME

- \$55,000 – Pledges and plate offerings

- \$300 – Coffee house
- \$200 – Amazon sales

Total Income for operations: \$79,200

Plus, there was Memorial Fund income totaling \$600 added to our savings account.

- \$22,000 – Facilities (mortgage, condo fees, insurance, utilities, maintenance)
- \$2000 – UU Association dues
- \$900 – Joseph Priestly District dues
- \$500 – Worship Honoraria
- \$900 – Other expenses (Religious Exploration, Minister's discretionary fund, other small expenses)

Total Expenses for operations: \$73,200

Observation: Many donate supplies and even maintenance/repairs without submitting a donation slip; this keeps our expenses artificially low.

Report of the Board's Operating Budget for Fiscal Year 2014-2015

ANTICIPATED OPERATING INCOME: \$88,500

- \$73,000 – Pledges (5% shrinkage)
- \$3,500 – Plate Offerings
- \$7,800 – Kaplan and other building rentals
- \$500 – Fundraising Events (Coffee House, Mystery Night)
- \$2000 – Education Ministry
- \$1,700 – Rebates (Giant Gift Cards, Amazon, eScrip)

PLANNED OPERATING EXPENSES: \$100,100

- \$65,450 – Personnel (with 3% increase for Minister, Director Religious Education, Choir Director, Accompanist)
- \$28,200 – Facilities (mortgage, condo fees, insurance, utilities, maintenance)
- \$2700 – UU Association dues
- \$1300 – Joseph Priestly District dues
- \$600 – Worship Honoraria
- \$1850 – Other expenses (Religious Exploration, Minister's discretionary fund, other small expenses)

The \$11,600 gap is much less than predicted for the current year and is based on realistic estimates.

Goodloe Volunteer Position Descriptions

President — The President will:

- Conduct monthly meetings of Board of Trustees. Communicate to other Board members meeting time, location, agendum, and other pertinent information. Convene meetings other times as needed to conduct church business in accordance with By-laws.
- Ensure attendance of all Board members at scheduled meetings and initiate action to replace any Board Member, who resigns, becomes incapacitated or otherwise is unable to carry out duties of Board Member.
- Convene the Annual meeting to conduct Congregation business as necessary, including election of all vacant positions as specified in the By-laws.
- Oversee the functioning of Nominations Committee, ensuring it is properly instructed to carry out its responsibilities to the congregation in accordance with By-laws.
- Oversee the functioning of the Ministerial Relations Committee, ensuring it is properly instructed to carry out its responsibilities to the Minister, the Board, and the congregation in accordance with the by-laws.
- Be responsible for the development of contracts for all staff members, overseeing negotiations of contracts, and coordinating all aspects of the contract with members of the Board and congregation as necessary. Appoint committees and individuals as necessary to assist in performance of these tasks.
- Ensure timely submittal of all required reports and information requests to the UUA, JPD, and GWA. Delegate responsibility to

the church administrator, various committee chairs and/or board members as appropriate.

- Be responsible for ensuring that each member of the Board of Trustees carries out his or her committee chair assignment responsibilities as delineated in this policy. Initiate action to assure committee chair assignments are carried out, including reassignment of duties as necessary.

Time Commitments & Expectations

The President is expected to:

- ⇒ Prepare for and actively participate in monthly Board meetings (3-4 hours per month)
- ⇒ Participate in other Board and congregational meetings and special Board activities such as planning retreats (time commitment varies)
- ⇒ Attend Sunday services as much as possible and be available to Congregation members after services (6-8 hours per month)
- ⇒ Participate in e-mail and telephone discussions of Board issues (2-4 hours per month)
- ⇒ Attend classes, read articles and take other actions to develop and hone skills as a Board member (time commitment varies)
- ⇒ Carry out the specific responsibilities of the President as noted above (10-16 hours per month)

Vice President — In the absence of the President, or at the request of the President, may be assigned any of the responsibilities normally assigned to the President.

Time Commitments & Expectations

The Vice President is expected to:

- ⇒ Prepare for and actively participate in monthly Board meetings (3-4 hours per month).

- ⇒ Participate in other Board and congregational meetings and special Board activities such as planning retreats (time commitment varies).
- ⇒ Attend Sunday services as much as possible and be available to Congregation members after services (6-8 hours per month).
- ⇒ Participate in e-mail and telephone discussions of Board issues (2-4 hours per month).
- ⇒ Attend classes, read articles and take other actions to develop and hone skills as a Board member (time commitment varies).
- ⇒ Carry out the specific responsibilities of the Vice President as noted above (time commitment varies).

Secretary — The Secretary of the Board of Trustees has general responsibilities for creating, collecting, maintaining, archiving, and distributing the records of the Congregation. In particular the Secretary will:

- Take the minutes of the general and special meetings of the Congregation, and distribute and archive the same in a timely manner.
- Take the minutes of the regular and special meetings of the Board of Trustees, and distribute and archive the same in a timely manner.
- Maintain the Board of Trustees' policy manual by incorporating Board additions and amendments as they are made, and distribute and archive the same in a timely manner.
- Collect and archive the miscellaneous records of the Congregation, such as employment contracts, insurance policies, Bylaws, etc.
- Archive the records of the

Congregation in both electronic and paper formats to the extent possible.

- Inform the Board of Trustees about missing or defective records, or inconsistent, incompatible, or contradictory policies discovered in the process of carrying out the Secretary's duties.

Time Commitments & Expectations

The Secretary is expected to:

- ⇒ Prepare for and actively participate in monthly Board meetings (3-4 hours per month)
- ⇒ Participate in other Board and congregational meetings and special Board activities such as planning retreats (time commitment varies)
- ⇒ Attend Sunday services as much as possible and be available to Congregation members after services (6-8 hours per month)
- ⇒ Participate in e-mail and telephone discussions of Board issues (2-4 hours per month)
- ⇒ Attend classes, read articles and take other actions to develop and hone skills as a Board member (time commitment varies)
- ⇒ Carry out the specific responsibilities of the Secretary as noted above (4-6 hours per month)

Trustee-at-Large

- Actively participates in the planning and management of the Congregation's business and administrative affairs.
- Shares responsibility for the approval of the annual budget, oversight of expenditures and protection of the Congregation's financial assets.
- Participates in the establishment of new Congregation policies and review of existing policies.
- Takes a leadership role in the

Congregation by action and example.

- Attends and actively participates in monthly Board meetings, other Board activities and congregational meetings.
- Listens to the suggestions and concerns of Goodloe members and brings them to the Board for action as appropriate.
- Provides support to Board decisions and programs through informal conversations with Congregation members.
- Demonstrates a commitment to the Congregation and to Unitarian Universalism.

Time Commitments & Expectations

The Trustee-at-Large is expected to:

- ⇒ Prepare for and actively participate in monthly Board meetings (3-4 hours per month)
- ⇒ Participate in other Board and congregational meetings and special Board activities such as planning retreats (time commitment varies)
- ⇒ Attend Sunday services as much as possible and be available to Congregation members after services (6-8 hours per month)
- ⇒ Attend classes, read articles and take other actions to develop and hone skills as a Board member (time commitment varies)
- ⇒ Participate in e-mail and telephone discussions of Board issues (2-4 hours per month)

Nominating Committee —

The nominating committee will present a slate of officers, members of the nominating committee, and trustees-at-large at least one month prior to the Annual Meeting to the Board of Trustees. In the interest of continuity each year, the nomination slate shall consist of candidates for members of the nominating committee

for next year, 2 trustee-at-large, president, vice president, and, on even years, the secretary, and odd years, the financial officer. A reasonable period of time will be provided for nominations by the membership. Nominations may also be made from the floor at the meeting with the consent of the nominee. In the event of multiple nominees, election of officers and trustees shall be by secret ballot.

Committee on Ministry —

Each employee of the Congregation appoints a representative to the Committee on Ministry, and the Board and Congregation each select a representative as well. There are two functions of the Committee:

- Performance evaluations of staff.
- Evaluation/feedback on the ministries of the church.

To accomplish the first function, the Committee:

- Negotiates with staff on specific goals for the year, creating Job Description (JD) specific to each employee.
- Receives information on any incidents involving on staff performance.
- Solicits input from the congregation, Board, committees and supervisor.
- Delivers evaluations and discuss with staff.

To accomplish the second function, the Committee:

- Develops methods for obtaining feedback from congregation throughout the year.
- Develops a tool to survey congregation.
- Solicits input from the congregation.
- Delivers survey results to Board and congregation.

Board Meeting Minutes*

April 9, 2014

Attendees: Cynthia Snavely, Steve Buckingham, Kris Peerman, Sid Soderholm, Pete Boudriault, Kevin Smith

Building & Facilities: The adjacent lot is being rezoned for mixed use.

Kaplan Scheduling: The current class runs through Easter. Two classes are tentatively scheduled through the summer.

Funding for Events: Future events need pre-authorization for funds. Given our very limited church funds, members should get approval for expenditures before spending church funds.

Previous Activities: The March Warm Nights event went well. There were about 25 people and plenty of food for all. The food pantry received the money from the CROP Walk.

Goodloe Celebration: The Goodloe Celebration went well, raising over \$2000 for the scholarship. There was no response from the neighborhood mailer.

Upcoming Events: Rev. Cyn will attend JP District Assembly this year. Christmas in April is on the 26th — Sarah, Sid, Ken, & Cyn will attend.

Annual Meeting: This is coming up on May 18. Steve will do a writeup for the annual meeting, and Sid will give a financial report. We will need to look at the budget. The Nominating Committee needs to identify individuals to fill the vacating positions: Secretary, President, VP, & Trustee At Large.

Committee on Ministry: Aileen, Sid, Steve, & Dick Wobus held the first meeting recently. They need to identify the goals and provide reviews to the staff personnel.

Finances: We are slightly over budget for our income. This is mainly due to the matching drive — Expenses were slightly more than budgeted, mainly due to increased utilities.

Pension Plan: Sid has contacted all staff members about the pension plan. In order to participate, the employee must sign a document.

Pledge Drive: Last year there were 23 pledges by the end of the drive & 3 additional pledges to total 26. Thus far 24 pledges have been received this year with an increase of 20% for pledged funds, totaling approx. \$76.5k.

Utilities: Clean Currents will be the replacement for Groundswell. The new date to lock in the rates is April 30. Ask Sarah for the report of the number of signatories.

Education Ministry: Nothing new to report.

Communication: There was a decision to simplify the budget that is published in the Odyssey.

Board Transition: The June Board meeting should be attended by both the outgoing officers as well as the new ones. The date for the June Board meeting will be decided during the May meeting.

Minister's Report: We will donate \$50 to Capital Pride. Normally they have a UU group in the parade.

Special Membership

Request: Trevor would like to be a member even though he lives in CN. Since this was an unusual request, Cyn mentioned this

to the Board, and the Board accepted. He can sign the book when he is available to visit, possibly July.

Budget: There was a discussion about the proposed budget for FY14-15. The proposed budget is about \$11k less than the projected operating expenses. Preliminary approval was granted, and the entire budget will be presented at the annual meeting.

The meeting was adjourned at 9pm.

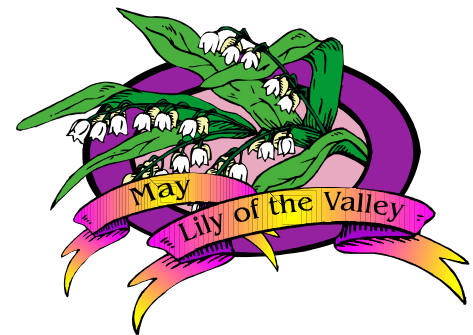
