Don Speed Smith Goodloe made a choice. He stood up for his beliefs when he was the first African-American to graduate from a Unitarian seminary. When he came to Prince George's County, he knew that he would not be allowed to preach in a white congregation. Much has changed in the past 100 years. Much has not.

Ours is a living faith tradition. We must choose when we face injustice. Will we conform to unjust laws that create inequality? Will we stand up for equality and justice in a courageous act of faith?

We are a mighty congregation. We have 3 paid staff, where many other congregations our size have none. We have a building, where others must rent. We have a resounding choir, where most others have none. At times, it is a struggle yet we find ways to continue our key ministries.

Our new GMUUC banner was unveiled at Water Service. It kept the traditional nature of two prior banners. It was wildly and vividly creative, going where no UU banner has gone before. It is truly amazing and astounding compared to all the UU banners at General Assembly.

And the UUA Moderator Gini Courter speaking at Goodloe!

Other presidents asked me how we got the UU Moderator to attend our congregation. Why does one of the top two UUA officials come to Goodloe? On the same day, we also get the JPD District Executive, and the JPD Trustee to UUA. Just one more amazing thing about our congregation.

It was part coincidence in timing with other local UU events. More importantly, we have pursued Goodloe Memorial Scholarship at Bowie State University. Knowing Gini, she wants to encourage congregations that take initiative to promote multicultural environments. We are one of the few congregations developing relationships with a historical black university, and that is also a legacy for an African American pioneer in UU Faith.

At Goodloe, we have a long tradition to be a multicultural congregation. We are succeeding more than other UU congregations our size. We are sending 4-6 people to Racial Justice Conference and 3 people to Transforming our Whiteness conference in October. We have all seen too much hatred and divisiveness in the news. It is our turn to choose. We must take courageous stands of faith for all people.

We have the courage and commitment to create a multicultural community. It is not easy. Yet, for some, we are leading the way. Our efforts can help pave the way for the next hundred years of this great nation. One nation for all people.

Goodloe's Religious Exploration (RE) Program for FY 2010 is Off to a Good Start!

A few factoids about your RE program:

- On September 26, 2010 the RE committee held a very successful 'first meeting of the year' with its new chair, Nita Page Daves.
- There are approximately 15 children and youth registered (or expected to register) in Goodloe's RE program.
- By the time you read this column, we will be well into our third week of classes.
- Goodloe's RE program includes one DRE, three teachers, four nursery workers and six volunteer teaching assistants; the RE committee is composed of six members.

I am very proud of our little RE program. We are able to do so much to our children because of the volunteers who give of themselves and of their time; the parents, who share their children with our community; and the larger congregation, who provide everything else. I thank you all.

One of my goals for this year, is to develop the policies and procedures that are necessary to support a good RE *program* (as opposed to supporting good RE *classes*). Goodloe used to have these policies and procedures (hence the church's history of a strong RE program). It is my goal to help Goodloe's RE program return to its glory days. And so, the RE committee (with the broader congregation's help) will be developing a number of policies this year.

The safety of our children is one of my highest concerns. I have had the pleasure of working with several parents in an effort to make the RE space safer. We have, or will be, implementing components of our new safety plan. These include:

1. Limiting access to the RE space by keeping the exterior door locked at all times.
2. Replacing outlet covers (as necessary) throughout the RE space and adding drawer and cabinet locks in the nursery, kitchen and RE spaces.

3. Limiting nursery access for children over the age of four. The rambunctious play of the older children can be unsafe for our babies and toddlers.
4. Storing nursery toys and books in a hierarchy of safety. This will limit access to some toys for our youngest friends (ages three and under), thus reducing choking hazards.
5. Implementing our new emergency evacuation plan. **In the event of an emergency (where the building has to be evacuated) parents are to meet their children at the condo building to the right of the sanctuary (unit 1542).** Do not come to the RE space (your child will not be there) and do not try to meet them in front of the church building (emergency staff need easy access to the building).

Copies of the safety plan will be available to parents, guardians and members of the Goodloe community in the next few weeks. We thank everyone for their support of this new policy.

JOB DESCRIPTION FOR CHOIR DIRECTOR GOODLOE MEMORIAL UNITARIAN UNIVERSALIST CONGREGATION September 2010

Preferred qualifications: A Music degree or Major with Choral training or comparable experience, as well as training and experience to carry out the duties described below.

Contract period: Ten months work (January 15 to June 15 and August 15 to January 14)

Compensation: Quarter Time (10 hrs/wk). \$5,000 for a ten-month period.

Responsibilities: The choir director at GMUUC supervises choir activities and other music related activities as defined below. The program and duties include:

1. **Worship:** Collaborate with minister or other service leaders in the creation of worship services; choose anthems and hymns in consultation with minister/DRE/service leaders/accompanist, emphasizing the diversity of our congregation; communicate and arrange for musicians at services; design and implement special musical worship services in conjunction with choir members; support and develop the experience of congregational singing;
2. **Adult Music:** Encourage singers/musicians to join the choir(s); rehearse with adult choir once a week on a weekday evening, from mid-August to mid-June, and lead choir on Sunday mornings, at least twice monthly (director is encouraged to provide special music for every service); recruit and prepare choir for special services, such as memorial services, installations and other state occasions. Serve as choir's lead contact in congregation's pastoral ministry. At choir director's discretion, he/she may create ad hoc choirs or musical groups to expand the musical experiences available to adult musicians.
3. **General Duties:** Work with lay leaders to plan program activities that will enrich congregational life and reach out into the community.
4. In collaboration with congregation's staff and leaders, cast a vision for the future of GMUUC's music program. Maintain contact with music colleagues in other churches and with the wider denomination through involvement in the Unitarian Universalist Musician's Network and/or other professional and denominational organizations. Maintain music budget and spending for music program. Maintain and cultivate the music library. Maintain congregation's musical instruments and attachments (carrying cases, etc.)

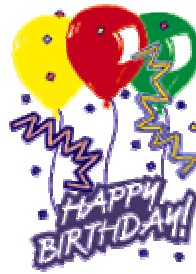

UUSC-UUA Joint Pakistan Flood Relief Fund

Since the world learned of the floods now devastating Pakistan, conditions have worsened dramatically. As of August 23, the Pakistani government estimates that **17.2 million people** are affected by the floods — **more than the Haiti earthquake, the 2005 South Asia earthquake, and the 2004 Indian Ocean tsunami combined.** The growing enormity of this humanitarian disaster has compelled UUSC and the Unitarian Universalist Association to launch our [UUSC-UUA Joint Pakistan Flood Relief Fund](#).

Donations to the UUSC-UUA Joint Pakistan Flood Relief Fund will be put to immediate use, since UUSC already has partner organizations in the region. Bedari, which worked with UUSC in the 2005 South Asia earthquake, is working to protect women and children displaced by the floods. Barakat, a UUSC partner in Afghanistan that also works in Pakistan, is helping refugee families who have fled to the district of Attock. The Rev. Dr. Terence Ellen, a Unitarian Universalist minister and executive director of the regional group, Unitarian Universalists for Social Justice, was instrumental in getting an interfaith panel on the program at the DC Green Festival at 3:30pm on Sunday, October 24. The panel, representing Jewish, Christian, and Muslim communities, and moderated by a Unitarian Universalist minister, will address why and how these faith communities are responding to the environmental crisis, especially with regard to environmental justice issues.

Panel participants are:

Representing the Jewish perspective, Joelle Novey, Executive Director of Greater Washington Interfaith Power & Light;

Representing the Christian perspective, The Rt. Rev. Eugene Taylor Sutton who is the first African American Episcopal Bishop of the Diocese of Maryland and was formerly the Canon Pastor of Washington National Cathedral. He wants to be known as "The Green Bishop," and has been a leader in addressing climate change as a religious issue; And representing the Muslim perspective, Imam Johari Abdul-Malik, who serves as the director of Community Outreach for the Dar Al-Hijrah Islamic Center in Northern Virginia. He was the first Muslim Chaplain installed at Howard University and has been cited by Greater Washington Interfaith power and Light for his leadership on green issues within the Muslim community.

The moderator will be Unitarian Universalist minister and administrator of the regional group Unitarian Universalists for Social Justice, Rev. Cynthia Snavely.

The Unitarian Universalist presence and involvement at the DC Green Festival is a reflection of the Unitarian Universalist commitment to caring for our planet earth, the home we share with all living things.

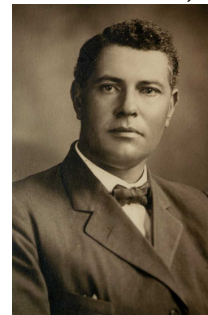
